

Lesson Plan: Future with will

Level	Beginner (A2)
Time	45–60 minutes
Skills	Grammar, speaking, writing
Focus	Will for predictions, decisions, offers, and promises

OBJECTIVES

By the end of the lesson, students will be able to:

- Use will to make predictions and talk about the future
- Form the negative (won't) and question forms of will
- Distinguish between will and going to at a basic level
- Use will naturally for decisions, offers, and promises

TARGET LANGUAGE (EXAMPLES)

Will — form

- Subject + will + base verb (all persons)
- I'll call you later. (I will)
- She won't be here tomorrow.
- Will they come to the party?

Will — uses

- Predictions: It will rain this weekend.
- Quick decisions: I'll have the soup, please.
- Offers: I'll help you with that.
- Promises: I won't tell anyone.

Will vs. going to

- Will: spontaneous decisions and predictions without evidence
- Going to: plans already made or predictions with evidence

LESSON PROCEDURE

1. Warm-up (5 min)

Task: Ask: 'What do you think the weather will be like tomorrow?'

- Students predict. Reinforce the form: 'I think it will be...'

2. Presentation (10 min)

Task: Four uses of will with examples.

- Show contractions: I'll, you'll, he'll, we'll, they'll. Won't = will not.
- Quick form drill: affirmative, negative, question.

3. Guided practice (10 min)

Task: Complete sentences using will/won't.

- 'I don't have my umbrella. It probably ___ rain.' (won't)
- 'Don't worry, I ___ help you.' (will)

4. Role play (15 min)

Task: Students make promises and offers in given situations.

- Situation cards: 'Your friend is moving house / Your partner forgot their lunch / It starts raining.'
- Students respond spontaneously with will.

5. Prediction activity (10 min)

Task: In pairs, students make 5 predictions about the future (10, 20, 50 years from now).

- Share predictions with class.

EXTENSION / HOMEWORK

Choose one:

1. Write 5 predictions about the world in 20 years using will and won't.
2. Write a short letter to your future self using will to describe your hopes.
3. Write a conversation where two people make offers and promises using will (10 lines).
