

Lesson Plan: Object pronouns

Level	Beginner (A1)
Time	45–60 minutes
Skills	Grammar, speaking
Focus	Using me, you, him, her, it, us, them as sentence objects

OBJECTIVES

By the end of the lesson, students will be able to:

- Identify object pronouns and distinguish them from subject pronouns
- Use object pronouns correctly after verbs and prepositions
- Replace object nouns with the correct pronoun
- Produce simple sentences using both subject and object pronouns

TARGET LANGUAGE (EXAMPLES)

Object pronouns

- me — She called me.
- you — I like you.
- him — I see him every day.
- her — Can you help her?
- it — I lost it.
- us — She invited us.
- them — I know them.

After prepositions

- Give it to me.
- She sits next to him.
- This gift is for her.
- We talked about them.

LESSON PROCEDURE

1. Warm-up (5 min)

Task: Quick revision of subject pronouns from previous lesson.

- Oral drill: teacher says subject pronoun, student says the object form.

2. Presentation (10 min)

Task: Present a parallel chart: I → me, he → him, she → her, etc.

- Focus on the two that don't change: you and it.
- Use example sentences showing subject and object in the same sentence.

3. Guided practice (10 min)

Task: Students rewrite sentences replacing the object noun with a pronoun.

- Example: 'I called Maria.' → 'I called her.'
- Include examples after prepositions: 'The book is for John.' → 'The book is for him.'

4. Communicative practice (15 min)

Task: Card game: students draw situation cards and make sentences.

- Example card: 'Your friend lent you money.' → 'She lent it to me. I thanked her.'
- Encourage use of multiple pronouns in each turn.

5. Review (5–10 min)

Task: Error correction. Focus on him/her confusion and 'I' vs 'me' after prepositions.

- Common error: 'between you and I' → 'between you and me'.

EXTENSION / HOMEWORK

Choose one:

1. Write a short paragraph about your weekend. Use at least four different object pronouns.
2. Rewrite a short dialogue replacing all names with subject or object pronouns.
3. Create 6 fill-in-the-blank sentences for a classmate to complete.
