

Lesson Plan: Pronoun case in English

Level: Advanced (C1/C2)

Time: 60 minutes

Focus: Subject, object, and possessive pronoun cases

Objectives

By the end of the lesson, students will be able to:

- Accurately identify and use subject, object, and possessive pronouns.
- Correctly apply pronoun case in complex sentences and formal writing.
- Recognize common errors and self-correct.

Materials

- Whiteboard / Markers
- Pronoun Case Chart (handout)
- Practice Worksheet (with answer key)
- Short reading passage with intentional pronoun errors
- Projector (optional for group discussion examples)

Lesson Outline

1. Warm-up (10 minutes)

- **Activity:** Quick oral quiz—teacher says sentences with incorrect pronoun usage, students correct them aloud.

- **Example:** "Her and me went to the store." → "She and I went to the store."

2. Presentation (10 minutes)

- **Review Chart:**

Function	Pronouns
Subject	I, you, he, she, it, we, they
Object	me, you, him, her, it, us, them
Possessive Adj	my, your, his, her, its, our, their
Possessive Pro	mine, yours, his, hers, its, ours, theirs

- **Mini-Lecture:**

- Explain each case with example sentences.
- Contrast formal vs informal usage (e.g., "It is I" vs "It's me").

3. Guided Practice (15 minutes)

- **Pair Work:** Sentence transformation task. Students rewrite sentences using the correct pronoun case.

- **Examples:**

"This is her's book." → "This is her book."

"They invited he and I." → "They invited him and me."

4. Error Hunt (10 minutes)

- **Activity:** Students read a short passage filled with pronoun case errors in pairs and correct them.
- Discussion follows with rationale for each correction.

5. Production (10 minutes)

- **Individual Task:** Write 5 sentences using all three pronoun cases.
- Peer review for corrections and feedback.

6. Wrap-Up / Homework (5 minutes)

- **Review Key Points**
- **Assign:** Write a 100-word paragraph using at least 10 different pronouns with varied cases.

Assessment

- Informal during oral correction tasks and pair work.
- Formal: Pronoun case quiz or written paragraph graded for accuracy.
